This has been a challenging year with the added stress of COVID protocols. The staff worked through this pandemic with calm and kept our youth safe in so many ways!

This year the board has continued to work on the goals of our strategic plan related to service delivery, organizational excellence, and financial stability. Thanks to the expertise of past board members, Carol Martin and Thomas Dennet, and consultant Rev. Victoria Andrews, we have a clear governance framework that reflects the work of Threshold with policies and bylaws that support our organizational structure and ongoing growth. In the coming months we will be updating our strategic plan and doing some work to clarify our organizational values.

This is a time of significant growth.

Threshold has taken on a supportive recovery contract specific for youth through Island Health, and we have bought a property on Niagara Street that is perfectly suited for this new program. We are working with Boundary Design to redevelop Forrest House on Oak Bay Avenue, and we are in conversations to purchase Threshold House from Oak Bay United Church.

We are in good financial shape. We have a Strategic Plan Task Force in place to help guide this growth, and to balance risk management with the opportunities to expand supports for youth.

It is an exciting time to be involved with Threshold Housing Society. It takes a wide circle of people with a variety of skill sets, resources, and life experiences to keep Threshold going and growing. It takes a wide circle of people to create a community where youth can truly thrive!

Thank you for your ongoing support of youth through the Threshold housing Society.

Executive Director Report



The fiscal year that was 2020-2021 will surely go down in the history books as one of the most memorable in the 31-year

history of Threshold Housing Society. A year filled with challenges brought on by the global pandemic, but for Threshold, a year also marked with great success. It would be fair to say now that Threshold has completed an exciting turnaround that has been three years in the making. This past year we have grown the number of safe homes we offer, we've significantly expanded our service delivery model, and have achieved a significant surplus after three years of deficit budgets.

Although Threshold has seen success this past year, it has not been without its challenges and hardships. When Covid hit our community and the world seemingly shut down, our staff stepped up and answered the call. Their dedication and bravery in the face of uncertainty and increased risk will be what I remember most about this year. When other programs and services shut their doors or reduced capacity, our staff stepped into the void and carried a significant burden for many months.

They are essential workers, and they steadfastly stood beside the youth we support as they navigated the changing world around them. Thanks to generous Covid-specific funding from the Victoria Foundation and the federal Reaching Home program, we were able to offer in house counselling services, outreach to youth on our waitlist who had no other place to go, and financial support for help with things like rent and food. These expanded services met an urgent need in the community as at-risk youth became more vulnerable due to isolation and increased marginalization.

Perhaps the most significant expansion came through the implementation of our new Supportive Recovery Program. In partnership with Island Health, Threshold has implemented a 9-bed program focused on youth who are struggling with substance use issues and are seeking help toward recovery. The implementation of this program represents the largest ever expansion for Threshold. During a 4-month period we saw our staff team double in size from about 15 staff to 30.

The success we've seen is proving sustainable and will carry into the years ahead. It is a direct result of so many caring and dedicated supporters who are seeking care for at-risk youth in our

community. The stakeholders we get to interact with at Threshold are inspiring, and their generosity remarkable. I want to share my deepest appreciation to everyone who has offered support to Threshold during this challenging year. Thank you to our donors, our funders, our community partners, our staff, our Board of Directors, and our volunteers. Threshold is a community-based organization and our success toward impacting young lives toward brighter futures is a direct result of the collective efforts of many.

We can end youth homelessness in Greater Victoria. We can create a system where prevention becomes normal and vulnerable young people receive the support they need when they need it. It can become a reality that youth in our community don't have to experience the trauma that comes from not having a safe place to call home and people around who love them.

At Threshold, we believe deep down in our core that this is possible, and we will keep pushing boldly into the future toward these ends.

Program Services Update



The Housing Program team has had a busy and eventful year. Trying to navigate a pandemic, keeping everyone safe, and at the same time maintaining our support services to youth has been one of the biggest challenges of my career. 2020-2021 forced our staff to continuously adapt their method of practice. Building on the lessons learned from 2019-2020 I felt our team was able to deliver outstanding support to the youth in our houses, as well as our SHY apartments.

In addition to the youth in our program we also supported applicants on our waitlist. At times, the list would balloon to 30 or more individuals who saw no other avenue for housing or support. The pandemic made it extremely challenging for these individuals who under normal times would have been able to participate in house programming, or more easily access community services. Access to housing for youth wanting to graduate was also more limiting because of pandemic restrictions.

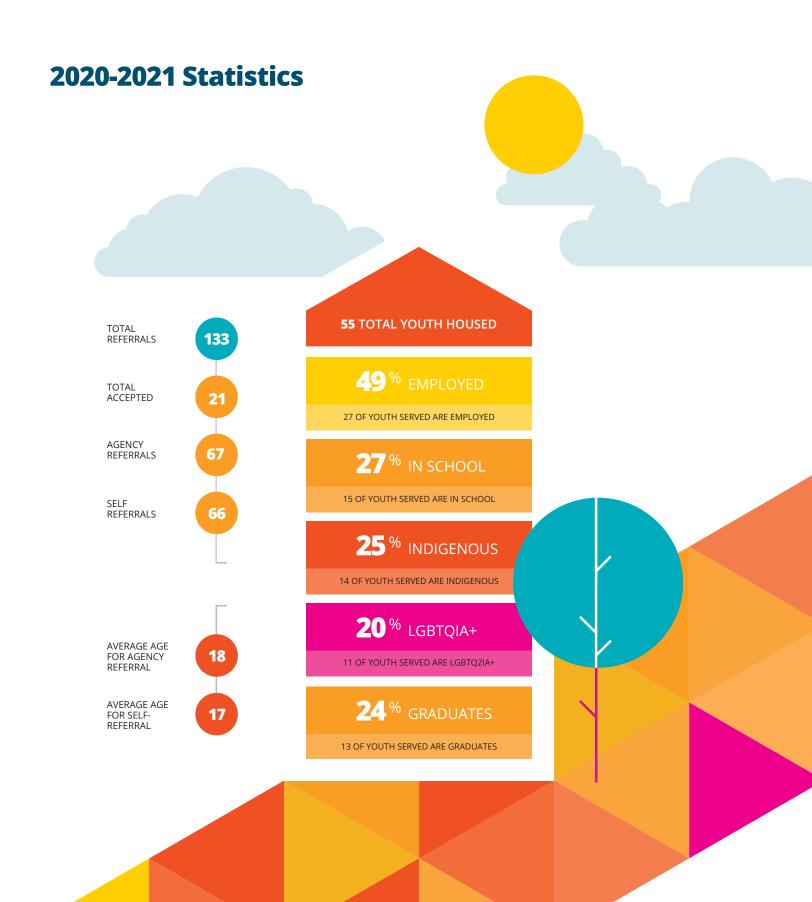
Our dynamic team had some major changes this past year. Everything from new Residential House Supervisors to a completely new Youth Engagement Liaison team. Although we had some sad goodbyes, the new staff continue

to add their incredibly diverse skill sets, and empathy for youth support to our work. With a now fully funded Intake Coordinator, this important part of our team has expanded into an array of services for new applicants.

Lastly, our scattered site units (SHY) expanded substantially this year by 9 units for a total of 19 units. We have added apartments all over the CRD. Two units in Brentwood bay, two in View Royal to name a few of the areas we can now support within. In February, we transitioned Forrest House into the new home of the Supportive Recovery Program and when we moved our youth from Forrest House into SHY apartments, they were part of the searching process. These youth had a hand in picking their own future housing and were all successfully moved. This is just one example of our youth centered approach to practice.

With reopening on the horizon, I am hopeful this new year will allow us to again expand our Foundations programming, to include more gatherings among the youth at the homes, to include waitlist youth, and invite guest speakers, re-examine a fully operational youth counsel, and invite community members to public events.

Youth Interview

Being off the streets and having stable housing – I began to think who am I as a person? Who am I beyond the trauma I have endured? I started hiking with friends, playing video games, practicing my religious beliefs, and re-connecting with friends.

How long have you been at Threshold and what brought you here?

I have been at Threshold for over 2 years. I was on the streets heavily addicted to crystal meth, and I wanted to get off the streets to complete a culinary arts program. I used to cook at a restaurant before being homeless.

How has your recovery been at Threshold?

Early on it wasn't easy, I had a few relapses. After a couple months of being at Threshold I began my recovery. I got the support I needed from my case worker at Threshold. I've now been in recovery for over a year and a half and in October it will be 2 years clean from meth.

How has your experience been at Threshold?

I'm non-binary. The level of support I have around my sexuality and gender identity at Threshold has been amazing. My Threshold suite has been the first safe place I have been able to hang my pride flag.

Back in December, I had left the Threshold program to go to Ontario to reunite with my biological family. It didn't work out and I came back to BC, and I didn't want to be homeless again. I reached out to my previous Threshold worker and a week later I was signing the papers to come back into the program.

How has Threshold helped you?

When I got into Threshold I had big goals, in terms of culinary arts. I knew I needed stable housing and to apply for school. I was in the foster system, and I knew I had supports through that for school, but I needed help navigating those supports. I also had ongoing support through Threshold after I got into-school for all the little things I didn't think of. My case worker helped me figure out all the bursaries around school supplies.

What is one thing you wish people knew about Threshold?

It's not just a supportive housing program, it's more than that. It's a way to restart. So now you've got your apartment, let's teach you some critical life skills. A lot of us haven't had guidance or parents. It's a plan for when you age out of the system.

What advice would you give a youth starting at Threshold on their recovery?

Use the supports you have and reach out. Staff aren't mind readers. Don't lie to your supports when you relapse. It never ends well!

At Threshold, don't be afraid to make friends. People are very sweet. I still talk to people in the communal homes, and it's been a year and a half since I lived there. Advocate for yourself and be loud!
